

Periodical literature is the cutting edge of women's scholarship, feminist theory, and much of women's culture. *Feminist Periodicals: A Current Listing of Contents* is published by the Office of the University of Wisconsin System Women's Studies Librarian on a quarterly basis with the intent of increasing public awareness of feminist periodicals. It is our hope that *Feminist Periodicals* will serve several purposes: to keep the reader abreast of current topics in feminist literature; to increase readers' familiarity with a wide spectrum of feminist periodicals; and to provide the requisite bibliographic information should a reader wish to subscribe to a journal or to obtain a particular article at her library or through interlibrary loan. (Users will need to be aware of the limitations of the new copyright law with regard to photocopying of copyrighted materials.)

Table of contents pages from current issues of major feminist journals are reproduced in each issue of *Feminist Periodicals*, preceded by a comprehensive annotated listing of all journals we have selected. As publication schedules vary enormously, not every periodical will have table of contents pages reproduced in each issue of *FP*. The annotated listing provides the following information on each journal:

1. Year of first publication.
2. Frequency of publication.
3. U.S. subscription price(s).
4. Subscription address.
5. Current editor.
6. Editorial address (if different from subscription address).
7. International Standard Serials Number (ISSN).
8. OCLC, Inc. Control Number.
9. Locations where the journal is held in the UW System.
10. Publications in which the journal is indexed.
11. Fulltext products in which publication appears or vendor intermediaries who make the full text available.
12. Subject focus/statement of purpose of the journal.

Please note that in the actual text, only the numbers 1 to 12 are used to identify the different categories of information.

Our goal is to have represented in *FP* all English-language feminist periodicals with a substantial national or regional readership, with an emphasis on scholarly journals and small press offerings. We do not include publications that, though feminist in philosophy, do not focus solely on women's issues. Nor, with few exceptions, do we include newsstand magazines. We are also forced to omit periodicals that lack a complete table of contents. We encourage feminist serials to build a full table of contents into their regular format to facilitate the indexing feminist literature sorely needs.

Interested readers will find more complete information on feminist periodicals in *DWM: A Directory of Women's Media* published by the National Council for Research on Women (530 Broadway at Spring Street, New York, NY 10012); and in *Women's Periodicals and Newspapers: A Union List of the Holdings of Madison Area Libraries*, edited by James P. Danky, compiled by Maureen E. Hady, Barry Christopher, and Neill E. Strache (Boston: G.K. Hall, 1982).

Suggestions for improvements of *Feminist Periodicals* are gratefully received. We would particularly appreciate assistance from readers in the UW System with our efforts to keep the holding information complete and up to date. Please let us know about new subscriptions, subscriptions we have overlooked, cancellations, or other pertinent information. *Feminist Periodicals* is also available on microfilm at the library of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin.

## ESSAYS

### Plaisir du discours, discours sur le plaisir dans l'*Heptaméron* de Marguerite de Navarre

Fabienne H. Baider.....11

Cet article propose de repenser l'*Heptaméron* comme une critique des rôles assignés aux deux sexes, et en particulier comme une remise en question de la passivité discursive et sexuelle exigée de l'être féminin. De fait, à plusieurs instances, l'auteure encourage le changement des règles du code de communication et, ce faisant, réussit à inverser les rôles sociaux et sexuels traditionnels : la femme échappe alors à sa position de récepteur/réceptacle pour s'affirmer en tant que locutrice et actante. C'est dans cette défense des femmes audacieuses que réside en partie l'originalité de l'*Heptaméron*. Les héroïnes les plus controversées vont en effet plus loin que le simple renversement des polarités des rôles sexuels. Le projet de Marguerite de Navarre n'est donc pas « de renverser l'ordre des choses », consciente que dans ce cas « l'histoire reviendrait finalement encore au même » (Irigaray 32). Elle va plus loin et rejette la dichotomie traditionnelle du signe, inventant par là-même une *agentivité* pour laquelle la binarité féminin/masculin n'a plus de sens.

### Voix féminines dans l'œuvre d'Agrippa d'Aubigné

Samuel Junod.....25

Cet essai s'attache à décrire les modalités selon lesquelles un auteur masculin comme Agrippa d'Aubigné ouvre le champ de son énonciation aux voix féminines et les paradoxes que l'on décèle dans son œuvre lorsqu'il s'agit de qualifier ce qui constitue la féminité. Plusieurs exemples montrent que la transgression d'une norme communément imposée aux femmes crédite celle qui la transgresse d'une nature autre que féminine. Tout se passe comme si la féminité était de l'ordre de la convention sociale et qu'au-delà de cette convention un épineux problème de définition se posait.

### Golden's Silence: Calelhon's Voice

Catherine Parayre.....38

A little-known author who chose to write in Occitan, the traditional language of southern France, Calelhon (1892-1981) conducted an intriguing reflection on agency and memory. Blending gender and regional issues, in particular through the two motifs of spinning thread and boiling bones, her texts include frequent scenes in which women use silence as an effective strategy in order to maintain the social cohesion of their community. In fact, in Calelhon's texts, women transform oppressive silence into a creative tool that allows them to preserve their endangered language from extinction.

### The Young Woman and the Sea: Lesbians Coming of Age in Coastal Communities in the Novels of Mireille Best

Stephanie Schechner.....50

This essay examines three novels by the contemporary French lesbian author, Mireille Best (b. 1943). At once a "regional" writer whose origins near Le Havre serve as the backdrop for her narratives and a "lesbian writer" whose protagonists are all young lesbians seeking to understand themselves and the world around them, Best defies any such attempts to narrowly categorize her work. Instead, her deployment of a wide range of images related to water is but one mark of her fully developed aesthetic vision. This essay seeks to illuminate Best's significant contribution to contemporary women's fiction which has received little scholarly notice to date.

### Un Air de famille : Tragi-comédie des sexes et androgynie

Martine Guyot-Bender.....64

Bien que la législation semble avoir réglé un certain nombre d'inégalités sociales entre hommes et femmes, les mentalités continuent à perpétuer un sexisme latent qui est source d'anxiété. *Un Air de famille* de Cédric Klapisch (1996) utilise le microcosme du repas de famille pour mettre en évidence le fossé qui existe encore entre hommes et femmes dans les comportements quotidiens. Cependant, loin de placer le blâme sur les hommes, le film démontre que hommes et femmes sont responsables de cet état de fait, et que seule une certaine dose d'androgynie – par rapport aux comportements stéréotypés entre hommes et femmes – peut réussir à apaiser les tensions entre les deux sexes.

## GRADUATE ESSAY

### Crime original / Crime originel: Women and Wrongdoing in Hélène Cixous's Writing

Alison Rice.....76

This essay examines the role of crime in the theoretical and fictional writings of Hélène Cixous. It draws from a variety of essays and novels to determine in what ways this writer aspires to criminal acts, what specific crimes she valorizes, and why she privileges the term "crime" over the concept of "sin." It then explores Cixous's reflections on her own plays to discern the "cathartic" qualities of crime and the specificity of the theatrical setting. Finally, it evokes the passion and pleasure Cixous derives from crime and addresses the ways in which she divulges her private transgressions in written form. As the title indicates, in Cixous's œuvre crime is at once present from the beginning and completely new, a truly *original* source of continual literary inspiration.

Dans cette entrevue, la vice-présidente et doyenne de l'Académie Goncourt parle de ses romans et de ses textes biographiques et autobiographiques. Elle décrit sa fiction comme une « interrogation sur le monde contemporain » qui cherche « le passage de l'univers matériel à un univers poétique et spirituel ». Questionnée sur le rapport mère-fille, elle le caractérise comme « le plus intime qui soit » mais aussi l'un des plus difficiles. Elle fait une distinction entre la relation lesbienne, qui est « un véritable choix », et celles où le sexe du partenaire importe peu, la bisexualité étant « l'état naturel de qui n'est pas encore déformé par le social ». Croyante qui vit sa foi catholique comme « une épreuve », elle est néanmoins d'accord avec l'Eglise que « l'acte sexuel, comme les autres actes du corps, n'est pas insignifiant ». Enfin, en citant les jeunes auteurs et les classiques qu'elle aime lire, elle nous fournit une liste d'écrivains à découvrir ou à relire.

### 'La Femme traditionnelle, c'est moi ; la femme moderne, c'est aussi moi' : Entretien avec Ken Bugul

Jeanne Garane.....101

Dans cet entretien, l'écrivaine sénégalaise Ken Bugul parle de toute son œuvre littéraire et répond aux questions concernant le débat autour de son livre autobiographique, *Rivian, ou le chemin de sable*, dans lequel la narratrice raconte comment elle devient la vingt-neuvième épouse d'un chef religieux musulman.

Narrating the Americas: Transcolonial <i>Métissage</i> and Maryse Condé's <i>La Migration des cœurs</i>	
Françoise Lionnet.....	46
From a picture of California's last Mexican Governor, Pio Pico, an African-Mexican, to Maryse Condé's <i>La Migration des cœurs</i> , this essay describes the transcolonial hybridizations at work in the "New World" diasporic cultures. This article presents the theoretical use of the term "transcolonial" in relation with space, time, and cultural memory. The concept is at work in Condé's novels, especially because she "crosses borders and boundaries" and because her narratives intersect with various linguistic and cultural systems. In her rewriting of Brontë's <i>Wuthering Heights</i> , Condé reinterprets the themes of miscegenation and incest transposed in the Caribbean. The "métisse intertextuality" of the novel (across continents, centuries, and feminist women writers such as Brontë and Beauvoir) "denotes a transcolonial epistemology" necessary to articulate the passages to Caribbean cultures and the production of knowledge, and a new lens on how to read the history of the Caribbean.	
La 'Réforme du costume' à la Belle Epoque

#### Women's Social Protest Theater in the *Université Populaire*: Véra Starkoff and Nelly Roussel

Cecilia Beach.....78

Between 1899 and 1914, a movement to create *Universités Populaires* developed throughout France. Theater played an important role in the *Université Populaire*, which aimed the workers in order to improve the social state. Both recreational and educational, theater drew the workers away from drinking establishments, developed their artistic taste, familiarized them with literary masterpieces, and instructed them on social issues. Véra Starkoff and Nelly Roussel were both involved in the theatrical activities of the *Université Populaire*. They organized performances, staged readings and lectures about drama, as well as writing and performing original plays that served to instruct the audience about social, political and feminist issues, and ultimately to incite the workers to take action.

#### 'Tout l'enfer est dans mon lit': le désir au féminin selon Mme Riccoboni

Marianne Charrier-Vozel.....91

This article updates and clarifies the reasons for the ambiguity in Mrs. Riccoboni's speech on feminine sexuality, comparing her epistolary novels and the correspondence exchanged with R. Liston during 17 years. This ambiguity is ultimately a matter of dialectics between individuals and society, between private and public, between reality and fiction, a hypothesis confirmed by the reference to pedagogues and physicians of the time. The novel writing affirms the capacity and the right of women to be fulfilled essentially on a phantasmatic register, while also claiming the feminine pleasures of friendship and solidarity.

#### Getting It Right the Next Time

Elissa Gelfand.....99

Feminist and post-colonial theory have made teachers of women writers self-conscious about the ideological underpinnings of our courses. A pedagogy that decenters the primacy of "French" in relation to "Francophone" and that crosses hegemonic boundaries helps students navigate cultural differences and make fresh connections among works. Concomitantly, a decentralizing approach requires that we rethink the logic of our courses on women writers in ways that incorporate textual and cultural encounters. Taking as case study a seminar I have taught frequently, "Mothers and Daughters," I trace critically several past versions of the course, from its first eurocentric incarnation through subsequent configurations with a broader geographical scope. In the hope of "getting it right," I propose a future model that will problematize its own object of study by building in social and literary incommensurabilities. The essay provides specific suggestions for grouping novels about mothers and daughters—based on thematic, discursive, and structural affinities—as well as references for contextual readings. Along with its intellectual and ethical impulse, such a course can bring students familiarity with geopolitical debates French departments and faculty are currently wrestling with.

#### Rewriting Rousseau: Madame de Saint-Chamond's *Jean-Jacques à Mr. S...*

Jeanne Hageman.....112

How did eighteenth-century women reconcile their conflicting feelings of admiration and aversion for Rousseau's social theories? In 1784, Madame de Saint-Chamond attempted to answer this question when she published *Jean-Jacques à Mr. S...*, *lettre pseudonyme*, a work that purported to defend the recently deceased Rousseau against an attack made upon him by Antoine Servan. Yet this defense ends up being far less than a defense of Rousseau and more of a defense of Madame de Warens, and, in fact, a defense of women in general. In a society controlled by men, where double standards abounded, the author defends women and their actions, including, most surprisingly perhaps, their infidelity, all the while using a narrator named Jean-Jacques to express her point of view. By integrating her own ideas and philosophies into those of Rousseau, never attempting to clarify where his theories end and hers begin, Saint-Chamond succeeds in creating a new and better Rousseau, a Rousseau who is more acceptable to feminists such as she.

#### Altérité et différence sexuelle de Simone de Beauvoir à la théorie *queer* Catherine Phillips.....123

« L'altérité de la femme » dans les discours dits phallogocentriques ou patriarcaux résulte de l'opposition binaire homme/femme, qui fait de celle-ci un être relatif défini à partir de l'homme et subordonnée à lui. Cette problématique joue un rôle de premier plan dans de nombreuses théories féministes depuis la publication du *Deuxième sexe* de Simone de Beauvoir en 1949. Tous les courants féministes et *queer* concordent pour contester cette altérité opprimante, mais diffèrent dans leurs stratégies subséquentes, lesquelles, toutefois, ne s'excluent pas les unes les autres, qu'il s'agisse d'atteindre l'égalité, de développer de nouvelles images de la femme et de nouveaux modèles du rapport à l'Autre, ou de détruire et de (re)combler les catégories du sexe. En effet, la problématisation de l'opposition binaire qui informe et motive ces stratégies aide aussi à déconstruire les oppositions souvent établies entre égalité et différence, essentialisme et constructionnisme, féminisme et théorie *queer* — sans pour autant effacer l'irréductibilité de ces courants contestataires ou la spécificité de leurs contributions à la lutte contre la conception de la femme comme l'Autre inégale de l'homme.

#### George Sand: Writing Women Writing Annabelle M. Rea .....132

Although Sand frequently depicted successful artists, the few male writers she portrayed were often shown as failures. Her women characters who write, however, reflect the challenges of her own writing vocation. In earlier works, such as *Isidora* (1845) and *La Filleule* (1852), females practice the domestic, non-public — "feminine" — genres widespread in the nineteenth century, the letter and the adolescent diary. Much later, Sand dared to create, in *Nanon* (1872), a woman who understands the power of writing and determines to pen "l'histoire de [sa] jeunesse." A study of the first-person accounts of these three ambitious title characters reveals a modern self-reflexivity in Sand the writer.

#### Artists at Work: Women Crafting Fictions in Sand's Day Mary Rice-DePasse.....142

In 1839, Sainte-Beuve published "De la littérature industrielle," his influential essay denouncing the trend among his contemporaries toward mass production in literature, specifically the *roman feuilleton*. Not coincidentally perhaps, the period that saw the increasing urbanization of what had once been a rural economy was also a period in which increasing numbers of women entered the writer's market. When women writers like George Sand and her contemporaries wrote, they not only transgressed the gendered lines drawn between public and private activities, they also had to negotiate new configurations of a labor market becoming increasingly focused on mass mechanized production. Some women writers, for their part, turned increasingly to fiction about artists and artisans. As doubles for the authors who created them, these characters in turn became objects of disapproval and derision for critics. A comparison of the critical reception of women's novels in the late 1830s and early 1840s and the fictions themselves reveals the stakes of a world in which literary works came to be identified with various kinds of labor. It also underscores how women writers came to redefine their own role through their working class characters.

#### Enfance magique ou infernale ? Un regard socio-critique sur l'œuvre de Mireille Best Janine Ricouart.....150

Cet essai examine les caractéristiques propres à l'expression de l'identité sexuelle dans le contexte de la littérature lesbienne. Il s'agit d'analyser la mise en scène des amitiés profondes entre filles et les stratégies de survie imaginées par elles face au monde des adultes homophobes ou incompréhensifs. L'œuvre de Mireille Best est révélatrice à ce propos dans la mesure où ses textes s'occupent de la formation de l'identité lesbienne à partir d'un groupe marginalisé aussi bien au niveau de l'identité sexuelle que de l'appartenance sociale. Chacun des romans de Best met en scène de jeunes adolescentes cherchant l'amour ou l'amitié entre elles et montre les rapports complexes de ces jeunes avec le monde adulte (parents et enseignants) ou le monde masculin (pères et camarades de leur âge).

#### Héritières et novatrices : les réalisatrices françaises contemporaines Brigitte Rollet.....166

La position et le rôle des femmes au sein de l'industrie cinématographique française présentent certains paradoxes : avec entre 15 et 20% de réalisatrices (par rapport au nombre total de cinéastes), la France occupe une situation unique, même si la plupart des dictionnaires et autres encyclopédies de cinéma continuent d'« oublier » ou d'ignorer l'apport des femmes à l'histoire du cinéma en France. Depuis les années 1970, certaines cinéastes elles-mêmes refusent à leurs créations l'étiquette « films de femmes », et proposent un type de féminisme souvent éloigné de celui des cinéastes qui les ont précédées. Moins militantes sans doute, leurs films et/ou documentaires permettent cependant l'expression d'un « engagement politique » héritier des années 1970. Depuis le début des années 1990, l'arrivée d'une jeune génération *post-baby boomers* a modifié certaines tendances du « cinéma de femmes » en France. Outre la réappropriation plus massive de genres traditionnellement masculins comme la comédie, le polar ou le *road movie*, ces cinéastes mettent en scène des personnages féminins moins conformistes, qui transgressent les limites étroites des rôles dévolus aux femmes dans le cinéma français. Ni mamans, ni putains, ces femmes offrent une alternative aux stéréotypes sexuels en cours depuis des décennies dans les « films d'hommes ».

#### L'Enfant des deux mondes de Karina Berger : un biculturalisme tranquille Catherine Slawy-Sutton.....177

L'Enfant des deux mondes (1998) fait le portrait d'une enfance maghrébine, et plus particulièrement d'une enfance féminine à une époque de grands bouleversements en Algérie. Ce premier roman de Karina Berger se rattache à des textes sur l'enfance devenus classiques, et il s'inscrit aussi dans la lignée récente de la littérature de l'exil. Cependant, parmi les écrits contemporains qui trouvent inspiration dans la colonisation, la guerre, puis l'immigration maghrébine en France, ce très beau livre prend place dans une mouvance relativement nouvelle de réconciliation vis-à-vis de la diversité culturelle et de l'histoire plurielle des immigrés.

#### L'Écriture du désir : marque particulière de la littérature contemporaine des femmes Metka Zupančič .....194

Dans ce parcours qui insiste sur les particularités de l'inscription du désir chez les femmes, je mets en évidence le premier roman de Michèle Sarde, *Le Désir fou*, pour aboutir à Annie Ernaux, avec *Passion simple*, en passant par les affirmations d'Hélène Cixous sur l'écriture-désir. La question centrale face à ces textes qui ébranlent un nombre de tabous, en apportant des variantes du texte-corps, du texte-désir et du texte-douleur, semble être la suivante : qu'espérons-nous obtenir de la littérature et, partant, exprimer par la littérature ? La question de l'éthique par rapport à l'écriture se pose, non pas dans un sens moralisateur, mais pour comprendre ce que cette littérature réussit à exorciser et à dévoiler, et ce qu'elle réussit à dégager comme modes de fonctionnement archétypal. A une quinzaine d'années de distance, la force de l'écriture du désir ne paraît nullement amoindrie : cette capacité de s'exprimer à un niveau particulier, d'une intensité assez inouïe dans le passé, serait alors une continuité dans l'écriture contemporaine des femmes (francophones) ? Le débat, par ces questions, ne semble que s'ouvrir.


