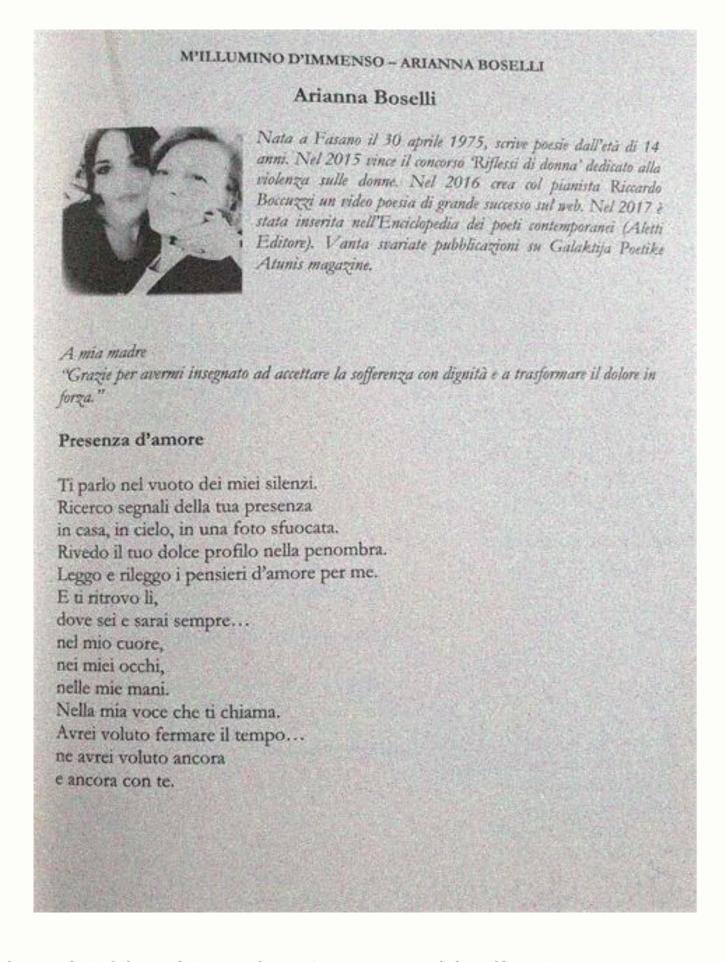


M'illumino d'immenso testo poesia

The poem "Tomorrow" was written by the poet Giuseppe Magaretti and was remembered as "M'illumino d'inmeno", precisely because it is the only phrase in the text of the poem. It was written in Santa Maria La Longa on January 26, 1917, and was originally titled Cielo E Mare; And it is part of the L'Allegria collection in the Naufragi section. It is Madiaretti's shortest poem and certainly one with the deepest and most recent meaning. The themes mentioned are the tension in light, the pursuit of harmony and merging with the infinite. In this poem, Giuseppe Mangaretti puts himself in the position of a soldier who comes out of the trenches and connects with the universe, so that a feeling of freedom arises. The morning light after night shows the idleness of creation that permeates me and fills me with joy. When analyzing this poem, we often underestimate the title, which is an absolutely essential and integral part of the poem. The title "Morning", or rather morning, is the moment when the rising light overcomes the darkness of the night and reveals the things that previously covered the darkness. This all-revealing light evokes a sense of immensity. It can be metaphorically "tomorrow", even the poet's electric shock, which reveals his inspiration and dictates new and hitherto unthought-of truths, makes you look for key words that express all possible meanings in their frames (i.e. Huge). because © is inexhaustible). 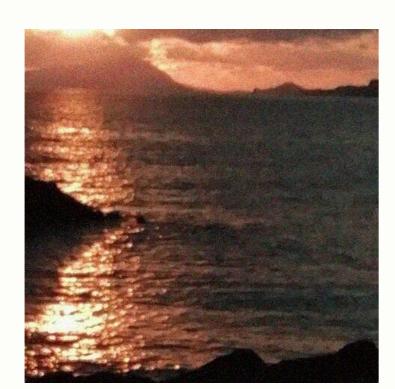

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The analogy thus connects the finite, represented by the poet in his human smallness, with infinity, represented by the immensity in which earth, sky and sea merge and mingle, as well as the pronoun "mi", which brings to mind the individuality of the poet and his personal experience through elision is melted and mixed with the light projecting it into the dimension of the absolute. There is also an enjambement between the first and second lines, because both verses should be united in one verse. The high proximity of the consonant M indicates that the alliteration M also occurs. Written in 1917, the very short text merged with Allegria with the final title Mattina, while in some earlier printings it had the authorship of Cielo e Mare. This primitive title helps give the text its proper meaning: Ungaretti gets up in the morning, by the sea; here the poet is enlightened as he witnesses the sunrise, the light of which is reflected in the sea. 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It represents the life and grandeur of life and continues to maintain war.
